

Manh Choh Reaches Steady Production

After 18 months of mining, ore transport and processing, we are proud to celebrate achieving **steady production at the Manh Choh operation.**

As expected with any major project, there were challenges in the early stages. But through strong teamwork, collaboration with stakeholders and partnership across all levels, we have delivered on our promise. Today, we can look back on several key milestones that showcase the success of our operation and the dedication of our people.

SAFETY FIRST

We are focusing on leading indicators and proactive efforts to further improve safety systems at Manh Choh with implementation of Safeground Principles at Manh Choh.

These principles are:

- 1. People Are The Solution
- 4. Learning Over Blame
- 2. Humility Is A Superpower
- 5. How We Respond Matters
- 3. Errors Are Normal
- 6. Context Drives Behavior
- Supporting the Safeground Principles, the Manh Choh team identified and implemented 1867 safety improvements in Q1 and Q2.
- In effort to learn and support work being done, **2862 Field Engagements** were completed in Q1 and Q2.
- **20 Risk Reductions** were completed in Q1 (11) and Q2 (9) where engineered controls were implemented to further improve safe operations.

PEOPLE AND PARTNERSHIPS

 The Manh Choh project directly supports 464 team members across Kinross and nine contractors and partners.

MINING MILESTONES

 To date, a total of 30.4 million tons of overburden and ore have been mined from the Manh Choh North and South pits.

ORE TRANSPORT

- Since the start of the project, the Ore Transport team has delivered 1.5 million tons of ore.
- Trucks have traveled more than 16.5 million miles the equivalent of driving around the Earth over 662 times.
- Black Gold Transport continues to maintain an excellent safety rating of ~98% with Samsara, compared to the national average in the mid-80s.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMITMENT

- Manh Choh remains fully compliant with all operating permit requirements.
- The Environmental team has conducted more than
 30 water quality samples through winter conditions to ensure compliance.
- Over **10 comprehensive reports** have been submitted to regulatory agencies to maintain transparency and accountability.

These accomplishments are not achieved without significant effort, dedication and commitment from every individual involved. They reflect our shared goal of operating safely, responsibly and productively, while delivering on the promise we made to our communities and stakeholders.

Environmental Update

At Manh Choh, our Environmental Technicians are committed to upholding state and federal environmental regulations to ensure the protection of the land, water and surrounding communities. Every quarter our Environmental Technicians collect samples of the surrounding rivers, lakes and streams. This data captures the conditions of the water systems and is crucial for early detection in water quality and allows for immediate response if needed. Many of these sampling locations are in extremely remote areas, only accessible by helicopter. Reaching them requires careful planning and

rigorous safety protocols. Technicians are responsible for maintaining helicopter landing zones in these rugged, often unforgiving terrains — clearing vegetation, ensuring stability and making regular safety checks. Their efforts help ensure not just environmental protection, but also the safety of field operations in these hard-to-reach locations.

This thorough, hands-on approach is part of our long-term commitment to environmental stewardship and responsible mining practices at Manh Choh.







World Eskimo Indian Olympics



Kinross Alaska helped sponsor the 2025 World Eskimo Indian Olympics, a competition designed to promote the culture, social games, skills, dances and traditions of Alaska, Greenland, Siberian and Canadian Indigenous people, and those of the American and Alaskan Indians and Aleuts. Last Tetlin Camp

Last Tetlin is a place where all Tetlin People go to harvest their winter foods. I remember all the households of Tetlin village would leave for Last Tetlin in the spring and come home in the fall. We all had dried fish, muskrats, ducks and moose meat, as well as rhubarb and berries before coming home. We only lived off the land since we didn't have perishable goods or a store.

Things I remember:

- There was a trail from Tetlin to Last Tetlin. Art said, "Jimmy Paul & Jimmy Joe ran to Last Tetlin and back from Tetlin before breakfast."
- Homemade fishing platform and dip net.
- No bucket to carry fish to the smoke house, we used willow.
- First fish was hung two days before eating.
- No loud noise, we had to be quiet or play far away from the fishing spot.
- First Village was Last Tetlin, Tetlin Village was the fish camp.

10 Mile Culture Camp

10 Mile Culture Camp took place in Northway, 10 miles up the Chisana River at the 10 Mile Camp. There were about 122 participants altogether, including 81 who stayed and camped the entire week. The camp went on for 5.5 days, with day one being the travel day, and the last day being the travel home/clean-up camp day. Each day was set up to start with breakfast, cleaning up breakfast, an activity, lunch, cleaning up lunch, another activity, dinner and then to clean up again. After dinner clean-up the kids were able to do their own thing, which usually consisted of swimming, volleyball, s'mores or games.

Day-time activities included moose hunting, harvesting and cooking the moose; fishing, checking the net and cooking; making bird houses, bookmarks with plants and flowers, wind chimes and beaded keychains and bracelets; singing, dancing and coloring for smaller children; and building a smoke house.

The youth and children also took turns doing daily chores – cleaning up after meals, taking the trash away, doing dishes, helping cook meals, keeping the steam bath going and stocked and picking up trash around camp.

On the first night of camp, some of our youth and older adults successfully killed a bull moose, which we were able to use as cultural education throughout the week. The older adults and elders taught the younger ones how to skin, cut up, hang, smoke and cook the moose.

We had a small potlatch to end the camp. Visitors joined us in a meal that consisted of the moose and fish that were hunted and caught during the week.

Big shout-out to our partners at BGT for their quick action in Delta! When a local hay shipment being transported by another party caught fire, their crew jumped in with fast thinking and a fire extinguisher. Thanks to BGT's quick response, the fire was contained and the hay was saved.
